Each year, the Church celebrates the Holy Family during the month of February. Bridging the seasons of Christmas and Easter, during this time we reflect on the period that Jesus spent with his family between his birth and embarking on his public ministry. As Catholics, we should strive to model the Holy Family in our own family lives. We also celebrate the Feast of the Presentation of our Lord (Candlemas) on February 2nd, followed by the Feast of St. Blaise (Blessing of the Throats) on February 3rd and Ash Wednesday on February 14th (Valentine's Day). As a reminder, Ash Wednesday takes precedence as a day of fasting and abstinence for Catholics and marks the beginning of the Lenten season. So, please be mindful and make plans to celebrate Valentine's before Valentine's Day this year!

O come, all ye Faithful!

Here at the start of February, we may have taken down our Christmas decorations, yet we recall the Infant Jesus once again on February 2—the feast of the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple. It is 40 days since Jesus' Nativity, and so Mary and Joseph bring the Divine Child to Simeon for a blessing, to make an offering of doves to God, and to mark the ritual purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

The hymn Adeste Fidelis (O come, all ye Faithful) is a perennial favorite of mine, and today I invoke

these words to all those who receive this newsletter. It has come to my attention that some of our Catholic neighbors regularly choose to watch the Mass on TV or Internet instead of coming to our beautiful Church for Sunday Eucharist. Some believe that the pandemic relieved us of our obligation, and that the "Mass-on-TV-as-a-substitute" provision was never rescinded. I must say clearly and directly: this is not the case!

We Catholics are indeed expected to attend Sunday Mass each and every Sunday and Holy Day unless we are prevented by some legitimate circumstance. Four years ago, the closure of our church rendered Mass attendance impossible. For those few weeks, your attendance was impossible, therefore no obligation could be placed on you. But ever since the churches opened up again, your obligation has been in place.

Please read carefully this excerpt from Bishop Olson's letter dated March 4, 2022:

"If one feels sick or is exhibiting symptoms of COVID-19 or any other contagious virus, one should stay home from Mass. If one has responsibility for the care of a vulnerable person and legitimately has concerns of infecting that person with a virus, that one should feel obliged to stay home from Mass. If one does not feel safe in attending Mass for ongoing fear of contracting the virus, one should stay home. The obligation to attend Mass remains in effect by virtue of Divine Law and the Precepts of the Church and, excepting legitimate reasons like the reasons listed above, binds every Catholic under penalty of grave sin. If your health permits, you should plan on being physically present for the celebration of Mass on Sunday and Holy Days of Obligation.

"While we know that viewing the celebration of Mass by means of live-streaming or television does not substitute for actual presence and participation at Mass, we also have learned that providing for live streaming of Mass is a very consoling service for those who are unable to be physically present for Mass with the community of their home parish..... I would like to restate my request that parishes consider maintaining this practice of live streaming for the sake of including shut-ins and those who are unable to be physically present especially for funerals and weddings."

Thus, I reiterate: O come, all ye Faithful! The broadcast of our Mass is intended for those who physically cannot leave their home or hospital room. Therefore, do not deprive yourself of the graces that come from worthy reception of Holy Communion. Come for confession, and come back home to Jesus in the Eucharist. Come and be purified as Immaculate Mary, make your offering to God in his temple like Saint Joseph, and receive the Real Presence of the Son of God, just as Simeon did.


